Despite their fundamental role as guardians of biological and cultural diversity, wherever they live, they remain one of the most disadvantaged and marginalised population. At the national level, addressing cultural policies for the benefit of Indigenous people requires a comprehensive and multi-layered approach, encompassing a broad spectrum of dimensions; from the preservation and use of Indigenous languages, to the safeguarding of living heritage practices, and the protection of Indigenous cultural heritage.

Culture influences literature through religious ideas, moral values, language, and gender norms. Literature allows to transmit the profound meanings of a determinate culture, its stereotypes, archetypes and collective conscience, creating the possibility of social change. Indigenous literature plays a very important role by taking the form of social agency. Such narratives reflect on themes of being caught between two worlds, identity crises, reverence for the natural world, and consequently form the social discourse.

Moreover, Indigenous Culture and Film Studies are two different areas that intersect and influence each other in various ways. However, there have been efforts to revitalize indigenous cultures and reclaim indigenous stories through Films.
