On the occasion of Zero Emissions Day, the Centre for Environment and Sustainability and Centre for Social Activities of Kristu Jayanti College (Autonomous) initiated a drive to monitor the alarming carbon emission rate in the atmosphere on September 24, 2021.

As Carbon emission plays a defining role in climate change, it is the responsibility of the younger generation to protect our environment from harmful emissions. As a modest gesture, the vehicles of the students and staff of Kristu Jayanti College (Autonomous) were checked



to assess the carbon emission level, thus contributing to the green campus to curb the emission rate.

The drive was inaugurated by Rev. Fr. Emmanuel P J, Director, Kristu Jayanti Col-

lege of Law. The emission test took place in the College premises with the issue of Pollution Under Control (PUC) by an authorized agency on 24th September and Pollution Certificates

were issued.

A total of 205 vehicles were checked for emission in a single day and Pollution Under Control (PUC) certificates were issued.
